SHE'S GOT HER MAN, A MAKEOVER AND A HELLUVA VOICE, **BUT ALL CHRISTINA AGUILERA NEEDS IS BRIGHT RED LIPSTICK**



LL 12 of her once-definitive body piercings are ancient history, as are the black dreads of the Dirrty and Lady Marmalade era.

After all, Christina Aguilera doesn't need overt remnants of raunchy feminism any-

She is a happily married woman now and, admittedly, still fascinated by the size of the rock record producer hubby Jordan Bratman gave her during their wedding last November.

What's more, she has been singing a different tune of late – and has been dolling up differently, too.

Sporting a Bettie Page-goes-blond look at a recent press conference in London to promote her latest musical offering, Back to *Basics* – a double album largely inspired by vintage tracks from the 20s through to the 60s that hits store shelves today – Aguilera spoke passionately about her new "visual inspirations".

"What I am going for with the bright red lipstick and the platinum blonde garb is the old screen sirens – the Jean Harlows, Veronica Lakes and Marilyn Monroes," said Aguilera, 25.

The touchstones of the album are the likes of Billie Holiday, Otis Redding, Etta James and Ella Fitzgerald – whose songs the four-time Grammy award-winner called her "fun music when I was a little girl".

But for those of you who think Aguilera is going from crass to class, be warned – such slander shall not be tolerated.

"Sexuality will always be a part of how

I express myself artistically," she said emphatically. "It is important for me to feel empowered by sexuality, not bogged down

'THIS IS MY ****ING WIFE!'

This so-called sexuality comes across loud and clear in the lyrics of her new album.

Nestled amid neo-classical songs such as Ain't No Other Man and I Got Trouble is the risque club track Still Dirrty, in which Aguilera assures her fans that she has "still got the nasty in me, still got the dirty degree, still got that freak in me".

Then, there's Nasty Naughty Boy that includes the rare poetry: "Now you better give me a little taste, put your icing on my cake."

"It's a tongue-in-cheek way of saying that I am still going to be provocative," said Aguilera – a former Mickey Mouse Club singer alongside Britney Spears and Justin Timberlake – who had her first hit single at age 18 with Genie in a Bottle.

"Marriage does not change that in any way. If anything, I've found a man who is proud of the fact that I have the balls to do

Proud may be an understatement. The grapevine has it that during the couple's sunset wedding in Napa Valley, California, Aguilera was coaxed into singing a song – the Etta James classic, At Last.

When she finished her rendition, Bratman, 29 - ever the goofy dude from Riverdale, hardly believing his luck – ran onstage, hoisted Aguilera and with a vardwide grin proclaimed: "This is my ****king

Looking back, however, Aguilera said the wedding was "a day of great growth".

"I never really had a positive male role model in my life, no father figure. So, I had to grow up faster than others," she said. Her mother, Shelly Fidler, separated from her abusive father Fausto Aguilera when the singer was six.

"The only day I missed having a father was on my wedding. I thought to myself: 'Who is going to walk me down the aisle?' It was then that I realised -I am."

But in Bratman, Aguilera – or X-Tina, as she is sometimes known – found the first guy who treated her like she felt a woman should be treated.

"Not many men can handle a woman in the spotlight. He's a great guy. Most importantly, I believe he will not do what my

GETTING INTO THE ACT

This profound love for Bratman earned him a dedication, Save Me From Myself, on Aguilera's third studio album.

Seguing from the in-your-face sexuality of Stripped (2002) to Back to Basics - which boasts a classical jazz, blues and soul sound created through the use of string quartets and jazz horns among others – posed a major challenge for Aguilera, however.

She had to learn new singing techniques to come across as authentic.

"Most of the album consists of modernday interpretations of the songs I drew inspiration from as a little girl," said Aguilera. "To do them justice, each song demanded that I get into character. This meant I always went to studio with red lipstick on."

For example, on the scratchy blues track I Got Trouble, Aguilera and her producer Linda Perry spent days figuring out how to produce a muffled sound.

"It required a fine blend of voice modulation and mixing mastery to recreate that 1960 magic," she said. "Back to Basics has been in the making for a year-and-a-half and it has been a fun journey. I'm really proud of what we accomplished."

The release of the album also coincides with "the happiest period of my life".

I'm in the best possible frame of mind ... the happiest I've ever been," she said.

"Sometimes, domestic violence can weigh heavily on people for a lifetime. But I have been getting it out musically, which has also been therapeutic."

NO PLAYBOY, JUST REAL ACTING

Aguilera is now set to criss-cross the United States and Europe over the next few months to promote the new album.

Interestingly, the release of Back to Ba-

sics also coincides with launch of Justin Timberlake's latest offering, FutureSex/ LoveSounds.

So, can her fans expect another combined tour a la 2003's famous Stripped and Justifed outing?

"It is very interesting that Justin's coming out with an album at the same time as me ... again!" said Aguilera with a laugh. "It's very odd and I swear that it is pure coincidence.

"No, but he's a great guy ... a good old friend. We had a great tour last time and I'll be happy to see him a lot more. As of now, however, there are no talks of a combined

Those eager for a peek at the re-vamped Christina need look no further than the latest issue of the British edition of GQ magazine, which features steamy photos of the singer in old-Hollywood mode. But partly undressed is as far as she'll go.

"I'm not interested in *Playboy* at this point. I respect women and only do things that make me feel comfortable," Aguilera

"It's just that there are so many rules, regulations and labels on women who express themselves sexually. The photo shoot was my way of putting it out that there I'm going to be free ... regardless of the labels that are out there."

Hollywood is on the cards as well – but don't expect to see Aguilera at a cinema near vou anytime soon.

"Yes, I am interested in doing a movie one day. Movies are like an art for me. But I want to take enough time to dedicate myself to it – find the right role and director," she said.

"I don't want to play myself in a film. I want to - quote-unquote - act. That will be an interesting time for me."

So, will being a diva suffice for now? "I wouldn't necessarily use that word. I

don't feel like a diva – most of the time I feel tired," she said with a grin. "To me, a diva is a woman who knows what she wants.

"But yes – I have always been in control of what I have done. I have always stood by every single thing that I have done. And you know what - I still do."
